

# Eco-Healthy Child Care Checklist

Easy to follow steps for child care providers to go green

All EHCC checklist items comply with <i>Caring for Our Children: National Health and Safety Performance Standards, 2nd Edition</i> .

<b>Pesticides and Pest Prevention</b>			
			1. We use non-toxic techniques both inside and outside the facility to prevent and control pests (both insects and weeds). If a serious threat remains and pesticide application is the only viable option, parents are notified in advance and a licensed professional applies the least toxic, effective product at a time when children will not be exposed to the application area for at least 12 hours (see manufacturer's instructions to ensure 12 hours is enough time). <b>REQUIRED</b>
			2. We thoroughly wash all fruits and vegetables to avoid possible exposure to pesticides, and we take the opportunity to educate children about the importance of doing so.
<b>Air Quality</b>			
			3. We avoid conditions that lead to excess moisture, because moisture contributes to the growth of mold and mildew. We maintain adequate ventilation (suitable fans or open screened windows). We repair water leaks and keep humidity within a desirable range (30-50%).
			4. We do not allow cars or other vehicles to idle in our designated parking areas.
			5. We do not use scented or unscented candles or manufactured air fresheners.
			6. During operating hours, we do not permit smoking anywhere on the premises or in sight of children. (Note: For the healthiest environment for children and staff, smoking should not be allowed on the premises at any time). <b>REQUIRED</b>
<b>Household Chemicals</b>			
			7. We use biodegradable, non-toxic cleaning products and least-toxic disinfecting and sanitizing products. When other products are required, they are used only for their intended purpose and in strict accordance with all label instructions. We store cleaning products where children cannot access them.
			8. We use chlorine bleach only when and where it is required or recommended by state and local authorities. We use it prudently and never use more than necessary.
			9. We do not use aerosol sprays of any kind.
			10. We use only low-VOC household paints and do not paint when children are present.
<b>Lead</b>			
			11. To avoid possible lead exposure from water lines, we use only cold water for drinking, cooking and making baby formula. We run the water for 10-30 seconds or until it feels noticeably colder. <b>REQUIRED</b>
			12. Our facility was built after 1978 (after lead paint was banned) - OR - the facility was built before 1978, but we keep the building free of flaking or peeling paint and regularly wash all areas around doors and windows. We use lead safe practices when removing lead-based paint or when renovating our facility, and we have visited <a href="http://www.epa.gov/lead">www.epa.gov/lead</a> to learn more.
			13. To avoid possible lead exposure, we do not use imported, old or handmade pottery to cook, store or serve food or drinks.
			14. To reduce possible exposure to lead-contaminated dirt, we supply a rough mat at the entrance of our facility and encourage the wiping of shoes before entering – or – we are a shoe-free facility.
			15. We check our toys for lead by searching <a href="http://www.healthytoys.org">www.healthytoys.org</a> or by purchasing lead testing kits at a local home improvement store.
<b>Mercury</b>			
			16. We do not use any mercury-containing thermometers or thermostats. Instead we use digital options.
			17. We securely store and recycle all used batteries and fluorescent and compact fluorescent light bulbs. For proper disposal of mercury-containing thermometers, fluorescent light bulbs, and batteries, please visit <a href="http://www.earth911.org/search">www.earth911.org/search</a> to find a nearby hazardous waste recycling facility.

<b>Furniture and Carpets</b>			

			<b>18.</b> To avoid possible exposure to flame retardants, we ensure furniture is in good condition without foam or inside stuffing exposed. Stuffed animals, matting, pillows and other foam items are also intact.
			<b>19.</b> Furniture is made of solid wood, with few, if any items made of particleboard. Visit CHEC's <a href="http://www.checnet.org/healthhouse">HealthHouse website – www.checnet.org/healthhouse</a> – and type in “ <b>furniture</b> ”.
			<b>20.</b> We do not have professionally installed wall-to-wall carpeting where children are present.
			<b>21.</b> Area rugs are vacuumed daily and cleaned at least twice a year using biodegradable cleaners.
<b>Art Supplies</b>			
			<b>22.</b> We use only non-toxic art supplies approved by the Art and Creative Materials Institute (ACMI). Look for ACMI non-toxic seals: AP, AP New, AP + PC, CL, CP, HL/CR, HL/NT at <a href="http://www.acminet.org">www.acminet.org</a> .
<b>Plastics and Plastic Toys</b>			
			<b>23.</b> We avoid toys made out of soft plastic vinyl (such as vinyl dolls, beach balls, and “rubber ducky” chew toys). Instead, we buy only those labeled “PVC-free”.
			<b>24.</b> When using a microwave, we never heat children’s food in plastic containers, plastic wrap or plastic bags.
			<b>25.</b> We never use baby bottles or sippy cups made of hard clear plastic (bottles labeled #7). Instead, we use bottles made of opaque plastic or glass. Visit <a href="http://www.oeconline.org">Oregon Environmental Council's website – www.oeconline.org</a> – and type in “ <b>safe plastics guide</b> ”.
<b>Treated Playground Equipment</b>			
			<b>26.</b> We do not have playground equipment made of treated wood – or – if we do, we seal it with paint or a polyurethane coating twice a year. Visit CHEC's <a href="http://www.checnet.org/healthhouse">HealthHouse website – www.checnet.org/healthhouse</a> – and type in “ <b>treated wood</b> ”.
<b>Radon</b>			
			<b>27.</b> We have appropriately checked our facility for radon by using a radon testing kit available from a local home improvement store and have visited <a href="http://www.epa.gov/radon">www.epa.gov/radon</a> for local resources.
<b>Recycling and Garbage Storage</b>			
			<b>28.</b> We recycle all paper, cardboard, glass, aluminum and plastic bottles.
			<b>29.</b> We keep our garbage covered at all times to avoid attracting pests and to minimize odors.
<b>Education and Awareness</b>			
			<b>30.</b> We create opportunities to educate the families we serve on eco-friendly practices.
