Anna Shares – Baker, Barbara (2004)

When Justin comes to play with Anna, her mother tries to teach her how to share.

Best Friends – Kellogg, Steven (1986)

Kathy and Louise, best friends, do everything together in school and at home. They even invent a pet horse, Golden Silverwind, who lives in a pretend stable between their houses. They imagine that the neighborhood becomes a fantasyland and spend wonderful hours playing. When Louise is whisked off for her family's summer vacation, Kathy is miserable when she learns that her friend can have fun without her. Worse still, Louise returns home and claims a neighborhood dog's only puppy, leaving Kathy feeling slighted yet again. Finally, when Kathy shares her hurt feelings, Louise understands and helps her resolve them.

The Boy Who Wouldn't Share – Reiss, Mike (2008)

Edward, unwilling to share his toys with his sister, has a change of heart when she has something he wants.

Little Bear and the Big Fight – Langreuter, Jutta (1998)

When his best friend Brandon will not share the clay at school one day, Little Bear gets so mad that he bites him, and even though he is sorry, Little Bear wonders if he and Brandon will ever be friends again.

Noodles has a favorite toy named Squeaky. Will he learn to share it with his friends? - Uh-oh! A thunderstorm is coming and Noodles is scared. How brave will he be?

The Patchwork Quilt – Flournoy, Valerie (1985)

Rabbit's Gift – Shannon, George (2007)
